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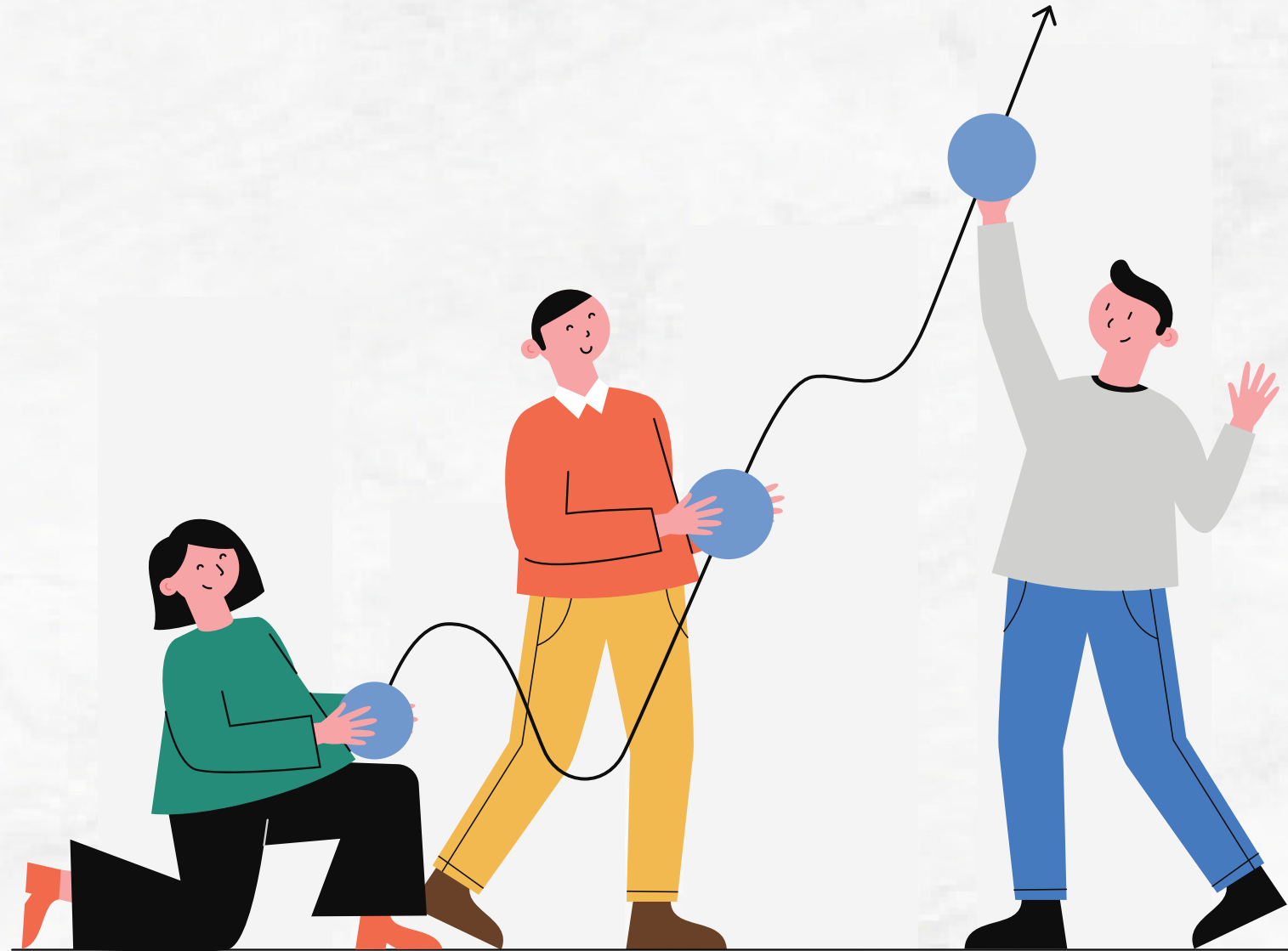

DEFINING FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

Family engagement is the ongoing partnership between families, schools and the community at large to support and strengthen the learning, development and wellbeing of all children and families.



Quality family engagement can have a **lasting effect on a child's social-emotional and physical health, school readiness, academic achievement, attendance, graduation rates and later success in life**
