- How do the engagement strategies valued by Black parents/caregivers align or diverge from the practices highlighted by education leaders in this study?






Research & Evaluation

Study Design & Methods

- Centering social justice, unearned advantages and disadvantages, different ways of knowing, context, and culture
- Culturally Responsive and Equitable Evaluation (CREE) and Community-Based Participatory Research (CBPR) approaches
- Methods
 - Literature Review
 - Parent/Caregiver Interviews
 - Educator/Practitioner Interviews





Literature Review



Literature Review: Culturally-Centered Strategies

- Include content about resilience to racism through racial socialization.
- Initiate explicit racial conversations (e.g., White supremacy and oppressive systems and institutions).
- Support Black parents in discussing their own concerns with inequities in education.
- Support Black parents and caregivers in helping their children develop skills around intersecting identities.
- Include culturally relevant and affirming practices.
- Acknowledge health and educational inequities that families face nationwide and promote self-care and awareness.

Parent and Caregiver Interviews





Parent/Caregiver Findings: What Parents Value

Accessibility of texting

- Integration into busy lives and promotion of everyday learning
- Strategies for self-care including awareness and mindfulness
- Suggestions for strengthening emotional connections with children
- Activities and tips to support their children's development
- Strategies and insight to inform behavior management
- Adaptability for homes and classrooms
- Texts as sources of validation for parents/caregivers
- Diverse imagery (including imagery that captures the diversity within the Black community)



Parent/Caregiver Observations and Recommendations

Content should:

- Align with their children's developmental needs
- Be culturally responsive and tailored toward Black families
- Reflect the diversity that exists within the Black community, including cultural and geographic diversity
- Include data and/or research on the benefits of recommended activities so that parents trust the source
- Use language that is widely understood by all parents



Parent/Caregiver Observations and Recommendations

Imagery should:

- Include diverse and relatable images of families from a variety of cultural and racial backgrounds
- Reflect and include kinship caregivers, kinship families, and older Black caregivers to appeal to multiple generations

Themes from Educator Interviews

Genuine connection: "Making sure we really understand and respect where families are coming from."

Culturally relevant pedagogy: Continually aim for families to "see themselves reflected" in the content.







Themes from Educator Interviews

Culturally competent staff: "Having folks who've lived the Black experience or at least understand it can make our [family] outreach a lot more genuine."

Tailored content: "It's all about making content that families can relate to...[that] reflects their experiences and values."



Themes from Educator Interviews

Community partnerships: "Rely on organizations that have already built trust and relationships with families."

Empowering families: Invite parent collaboration and co-creation to deepen engagement.

Reflecting Families' Voices through a Collaborative Process

Begin with Collaboration

WHO is this FOR becomes WHO is this WITH

The who is defined by community collaborators

- Check for inclusion by asking, "Who is not at the table?"
- The invitation to collaborate follows the line of trust.





Clearly Define The Given Circumstances

For example:

- Family engagement messages
- 160 characters
- Delivered via text message



FACT: Teens need to make some decisions on their own. It builds independence and confidence. You can help them think through decisions by asking questions.

TIP: Next time your teen's making a decision, like which activity to choose, ask questions. "What's 1 positive thing about each choice? Any negatives?"

GROWTH: Keep supporting your teen in making their own decisions. Ask, "What can you do to help you make your decision? Do research? Talk to a teacher?"



Planning Happens WITH Participants

Participants shape the questions being asked.

- When it comes to _____ what questions do you WANT to be asked?
- What questions would you like to ask your friends/fellow parents and caregivers?
- What questions can we ask to better understand your strengths and needs?

Participants help define the WHEN and WHERE of collaboration

Ask: How can we maximize collaboration by minimizing barriers to participation?



Active Listening Active Learning

- Set the stage
- Set norms
- Ask in many ways and offer many ways to answer
- Respond to real time shifts
- Check for understanding





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And Then ...

Share out top line summary and ask for feedback:

Did we get this right? What's missing? Now that you've had more time to think about this, what would you add or change?

- Create content and share out for feedback
- Engage in ongoing feedback loops
- Remain open to edits, additions, and changes
- Look at content as living, breathing, evolving



A few things we've learned from ongoing feedback

- Give play a central focus
- Self care led by Black families
- Check images associated with challenging behaviors
- Draw on community resources
